THE MEMORY WALL

You may have noticed that the cemetery is getting full and the wall in the Garden of Remembrance is also getting covered. Some time ago the Parish Council had to make the decision that only Residents of Great Ayton could be buried, or have their ashes, in the cemetery. This is understandably distressing for quite a few people. Men and women who have lived in the village for many years and then moved away can not come "home" when they die, as their relatives wish.

There are exceptions – ashes can be buried in an existing family grave, and people who have had to go into Nursing Homes are still classed as Residents. However, many other people would like to return to – or be remembered in – the village.

The Parish Council has decided to build a wall at the opposite end of the Garden of Remembrance to the existing one, to be called The Memory Wall. The builder Chris Pearson is to build it and has kindly offered his labour at no cost, as it is for past local Residents. A plaque can be placed there, to be the same size as those on the opposite wall and obtainable from Peel Engravers, Middlesbrough. Suggested wording could be:

"Remembering (Name) who was born in the village and lived here for many years but who died in (Place)."

HAMBLETON OVER FIFTIES FORUM -

If you are eligible - why not join? It's free!

Two really useful information events for the Over 50s have taken place in Stokesley recently. A large number of organisations from the statutory and voluntary sectors came together to display leaflets on their services, and to offer advice and contacts for future use.

The first event took place in Stokesley Library in November 2009, concentrating on health and social care, with displays from James Cook Hospital and NYCC Adult & Community Services plus information from Broadacres and NYCC Extra Care Housing. Support for those in their own homes was on offer from the Hambleton & Richmondshire Carers Centre and from Vale and Dale, for home improvements, and from many others.

The second event, in Stokesley Town Hall on 26th March, placed more emphasis on education and leisure opportunities (check out Eng-AGE into Sport), including local churches and the Stokesley & District CCA. Other basic information on Benefits and Pensions, from the Energy Saving Trust, and from the Police, was also available. How did it all start?

After the founding of the Camphill schools, near Aberdeen, for children with special needs, many parents worried that their children would move on to state mental institutions, wasting the talents revealed by their inspiring education. In 1955, guided by Dr Karl Konig, the founder, the Botton Hall Estate was purchased. A new kind of village was created – where adults with a mental disability could live a normal life in a caring community, each making a real contribution according to personal potential. There is now a population of about 320 living in 30 houses. Botton is simply a collection of families, each with its own characteristics. Typically, a couple, with or without children of their own, act as house parents, assisted by young, trainee co-workers. They are responsible for up to 8 adults with special needs, all working together to make the house a family home.

Who runs it?

We do! Botton is one of 11 Camphill Village Trust communities, each responsible for its own governance. Overall accountability rests with our Local Management Committee, but deciding the practicalities of everyday life lies firmly with those who live here.

How is it supported?

Through a variety of agencies, primarily North Yorkshire's "Supporting People" scheme and Social Services care budgets. Housing Benefit helps with accommodation costs, while Income Support and Disability Living Allowance cover personal living expenses. We also receive income from the sales of our crafts and produce, but must fund-raise to pay for new buildings or improvements. There are 5 farms, several gardens and a dozen work-shops in Botton producing everything from bio-dynamic dairy foods to fine hand-crafted toys.

Is anyone paid for their work?

No-one receives a wage here. We work to meet the needs of the rest of the community. Every job is important – home-making, gardening, milking the cows or doing the accounts – we do not value one person's work above another's: each task is essential in its own way. Each person's individual needs are met, not from his own work, but from the work of all.

Is there a special philosophy?

Yes, definitely. Camphill communities are based on the work of the Austrian philosopher Dr Rudolf Steiner (1861 – 1925). His ideas are practised throughout the world in education, agriculture, medicine, economics & social life. Work is one of the fundamental tenets of our philosophy; another is learning through creative activities. Both give a huge sense of achievement.

What about social activities?

Although we are each free to observe our own religion, the community practises Christian values and holds Christian services throughout the week. We have a very rich cultural and social life, especially at the main Christian festivals, and a continuing programme of adult education courses. Among other things, there's a bio-dynamic agriculture course (an enhanced form of organic husbandry) and a Waldorf (Steiner) school for children of co-workers and those from local families.

What has Botton achieved?

Our way of life is not the answer to everyone's needs, but for the vulnerable adults living here now, or who could benefit in the future, it offers a rewarding, fulfilling and happy life – for however long or short a time they choose to stay. Botton has been the inspiration for dozens of communities worldwide. There are now over 90 Camphill places in 20 countries, run on similar lines to Botton Village.

Our Open Day (or Summer Fair) is on the first Sunday in July - do come and see us.

We are interested in all sorts of items: things that you picked up while out walking or things you have at home. Flints, pottery (pieces or whole items), pictures, photographs, books, implements, WW1 and WW2 memorabilia, old newspapers, family memorabilia; the list is endless. **Entry is free**, with light refreshments available.

On 2nd June 1976 the first Wednesday Morning Forum was held – an exploratory meeting in the Village Hall, Gt. Ayton, attended by 20 retired people. Junior football section

This football season has proved to be one of the wettest in memory and due to waterlogged pitches no games were played at the Ayton sports fields for 3 consecutive weeks, with other weekends also postponed, causing numerous fixtures to be re-scheduled. However, the enthusiasm for football, especially in the junior section, has remained very strong, both from the players and the volunteers who run the teams. Local coach Billy Hamer continues to weave his magic and lead the junior section, giving many hours of his time to ensure the best opportunities are provided for local youngsters to come and play football, equally well supported by the coaching staff in each team. With the support of a Football Foundation grant we have increased the number of teams within the football section with 8 age group teams.

Coaches Joe Walker and Anthony Walker are very pleased with their Under-8 squad of players, who are predominantly from the village. They have played 2 friendlies resulting in a win and loss. Training is carried out Saturdays and evenings: all children 6-8 are welcome. We have a great squad and are looking forward to the new season. Our Under-9 team have progressed well from the early season defeats, grown in confidence and the team, mainly youngsters from the village, are now showing their potential for the future. Coaches Matty Hamer and Ian Vallely believe this squad of players will mature into a strong team. Ayton Under-10s, coached by Richard Davey and Chris Hore, are in their second season and have progressed well, lying in mid-table. With a bit more consistency the team could easily be competing with the division's top sides. We hope to build a bigger squad and challenge for honours as we move to 11-a-side next season.

Simon Taylor and Pete Marsden's **Under-11** football team has been together for the last 3 seasons. The team has grown from a small squad of players to a squad of 15, and this year has seen the boys mature and grow into a close knit group. The team has been very fortunate in that the majority live in the village, but has been able to attract players from nearby towns such as Nunthorpe, Marton and Guisborough. They have had their ups and downs throughout the seasons but this year has proved to be their best yet. A superb start with a 4-0 win against Dormanstown proved to be what they needed to inspire them to go on to be determined to win further matches against Tollesby & Stockton Rangers. They hope to continue throughout the remainder of the season. The team has been supported by friends, relatives and sponsors making every match, rain or shine, tense & nail biting, but all thoroughly enjoyable. Leading the division the **Under-12** team has had a good season - just reward for the hard work put in during training. A couple more wins should see the team crowned champions this season. This squad is well motivated by coaches Andy Banfield and Mark Horn. The Under-13 team, coached by Frankie Mcgee and Billy Hamer, are having a great season, hoping to make 3 promotions in 3 consecutive seasons, winning all league and cup games to date. They are hoping they can make the finals day for the league with the game played at the Middlesbrough F.C. training ground. Could this be a league and cup double? Our **Under-14** squad players are in mid-table in their league; a number of changes in the team this season, but with the squad playing some good football towards the end of this season, hopes are high for the next campaign.

A Reminder of Jesus

Do you remember learning mnemonics at school? Can't remember what a mnemonic is? It's something that helps you remember something important.

Learning the musical notes for the recorder, our teacher stressed *Every Good Boy Deserves Favour* to remind us of the order of the musical notes. As custodians of our heritage, we have the choice to let things deteriorate further or to do something about it now. The estimate for repair is £20,000, due mainly to the height of the panels and the difficulty of access. If we act now, our insurers may make a contribution towards those parts damaged by water ingress – which has now been fixed. If we wait we could lose this.

As the Chancel is the focal point for all services in Church, we have decided to go ahead this autumn, rather than wait for an upturn in the economy, which could be a very long time in coming. It is a lot of money to find, but we hope with the goodwill of the community that this will be possible.

Mackerel Pâté

Ingredients

1 tin Mackerel 2 tablesp (30 ml) Lemon juice Cress or Parsley & Lemon slices to garnish

3 oz (85 g) Butter 1 tablesp (15 ml) Vinegar Salt and Pepper

Method

- 1. Remove the mackerel from the tin, drain off the liquid; remove the skin & any bones.
- 2. Cut the lemon in half, cut off one or two neat slices for garnish.
- 3. Squeeze the juice from the rest of the lemon.
- 4. Mix the mackerel, butter, lemon juice, vinegar, salt & pepper in a basin.
- 5. Beat very thoroughly with a fork and then with a wooden spoon until smooth.
- 6. Put into a small dish & smooth the top. Chill. Garnish with cress or parsley & lemon slices.
- 7. Serve this with fingers of toast or French buns.

Chicken Country Style

Ingredients

- 1 Chicken, 1½ pint (850 ml) Chicken Stock, ½ lb (227g) Carrots, ½ lb (227g) Cheddar Cheese
- 1 large Leek, 1 pint (566 ml) White Sauce, 1/2 lb (227g) Parsnips, 2 oz (57g) Margarine

Method

- 1. Cook the chicken. When it is cool strip the meat from the bones and tease apart.
- 2. Chop all vegetables into small bite size pieces and place into a pan with melted margarine for 5 minutes on a low heat & sweat out (cover with greaseproof paper & pan lid).
- 3. Uncover to add stock cubes dissolved in boiling water.
- 4. Simmer on low heat until part-cooked.
- 5. Place the vegetables in the bottom of a casserole dish with only a little of the stock.
- 6. Place the cooked chicken on top of the vegetables once cooled.
- 7. Make the white sauce. Add the cheese, grated, saving some to sprinkle over the sauce.
- 8. Pour the white sauce over the chicken then sprinkle on it the remaining cheese.
- 9. Cook in the oven: Gas 5 / 190° C / 375° F until browned and heated through thoroughly.
- 10. Serve with potatoes and salad.

Lemon Cheesecake

Ingredients

6 oz (170g) Digestive Biscuits, 8 oz (227g) low fat Curd/ Cream Cheese, 2 oz (57g) Caster Sugar 3 oz (85g) Butter/Margarine, 1/4 pint (141 ml) fresh Double Cream/Whipping Cream 1 Lemon

Method

- 1, Crush the biscuits with a rolling pin.
- 2. Melt the butter in a pan; stir in the biscuit crumbs.
- 3. Line a flan case or shallow dish, about 8" (30 cm) in diameter, & put in a cold place.
- 4. Wash the lemon. Grate the rind finely & squeeze out & save the juice and the rind.
- 5. Whip the cream until thick. Beat the cheese to soften it. Stir the cream into the cheese.
- 6. Fold in the sugar, lemon rind, and lemon juice
- 7. Spread the mixture over the crumbs and chill before serving.

Rocky Road Biscuits

Ingredients

4 Mars Bars, ½ packet Shortbread Biscuits, 2 oz (50g) Rice Krispies, 1 tablesp (15ml) Cream 5 oz (140g) Marshmallows 4 oz (100g) Butter, Chocolate to cover if liked

Method

- 1. Melt the Mars Bars with the cream; add the butter.
- 2. Break the biscuits into pieces and add to the mixture with marshmallows & Rice Krispies.
- 3. Press into an oiled tin. (Coat with melted chocolate if liked.) Leave to set.
- 4. Cut into fingers.

Mackerel Pâté

Ingredients

1 tin Mackerel 2 tablesp (30 ml) Lemon juice Cress or Parsley & Lemon slices to garnish

3 oz (85 g) Butter 1 tablesp (15 ml) Vinegar

Salt and Pepper

<u>Method</u>

- 1. Remove the mackerel from the tin, drain off the liquid; remove the skin & any bones.
- 2. Cut the lemon in half, cut off one or two neat slices for garnish.
- 3. Squeeze the juice from the rest of the lemon.
- 4. Mix the mackerel, butter, lemon juice, vinegar, salt & pepper in a basin.
- 5. Beat very thoroughly with a fork and then with a wooden spoon until smooth.
- 6. Put into a small dish & smooth the top. Chill. Garnish with cress or parsley & lemon slices.
- 7. Serve this with fingers of toast or French buns.

Chicken Country Style

Ingredients

- 1 Chicken, 1½ pint (850 ml) Chicken Stock, ½ lb (227g) Carrots, ½ lb (227g) Cheddar Cheese
- 1 large Leek, 1 pint (566 ml) White Sauce, 1/2 lb (227g) Parsnips, 2 oz (57g) Margarine

<u>Method</u>

- 1. Cook the chicken. When it is cool strip the meat from the bones and tease apart.
- 2. Chop all vegetables into small bite size pieces and place into a pan with melted margarine for 5 minutes on a low heat & sweat out (cover with greaseproof paper & pan lid).
- 3. Uncover to add stock cubes dissolved in boiling water.
- 4. Simmer on low heat until part-cooked.
- 5. Place the vegetables in the bottom of a casserole dish with only a little of the stock.
- 6. Place the cooked chicken on top of the vegetables once cooled.
- 7. Make the white sauce. Add the cheese, grated, saving some to sprinkle over the sauce.
- 8. Pour the white sauce over the chicken then sprinkle on it the remaining cheese.
- 9. Cook in the oven: Gas 5 / 190° C / 375° F until browned and heated through thoroughly.
- 10. Serve with potatoes and salad.

Lemon Cheesecake

Ingredients

6 oz (170g) Digestive Biscuits, 8 oz (227g) low fat Curd/ Cream Cheese, 2 oz (57g) Caster Sugar 3 oz (85g) Butter/Margarine, ¼ pint (141 ml) fresh Double Cream/Whipping Cream 1 Lemon

Method

- 1, Crush the biscuits with a rolling pin.
- 2. Melt the butter in a pan; stir in the biscuit crumbs.
- 3. Line a flan case or shallow dish, about 8" (30 cm) in diameter, & put in a cold place.
- 4. Wash the lemon. Grate the rind finely & squeeze out & save the juice and the rind.
- 5. Whip the cream until thick. Beat the cheese to soften it. Stir the cream into the cheese.
- 6. Fold in the sugar, lemon rind, and lemon juice
- 7. Spread the mixture over the crumbs and chill before serving.

Rocky Road Biscuits

Ingredients

4 Mars Bars, ½ packet Shortbread Biscuits, 2 oz (50g) Rice Krispies, 1 tablesp (15ml) Cream 4 oz (100g) Butter, 5 oz (140g) Marshmallows Chocolate to cover if liked

Method

- 1. Melt the Mars Bars with the cream; add the butter.
- 2. Break the biscuits into pieces and add to the mixture with marshmallows & Rice Krispies.
- 3. Press into an oiled tin. (Coat with melted chocolate if liked.) Leave to set.
- 4. Cut into fingers.

North Yorkshire County Council's <u>Home Library and Information Service</u> works with local volunteers to bring the Library service to people who are unable to visit the Library itself because of ill health or disability. Carers are also eligible for this free, fortnightly service which currently delivers books and audio books to nineteen people in the Great Ayton area.

'I thought that I would have to give up using the library; but the Home Library Service has come to my rescue.'

John and Cathy at Gt Ayton Library select books for their Home Library Service users based on information collected by Chris Bower, the Community and Information Officer responsible for local Libraries, who visits new customers in their homes to talk about the sort of books and authors they like to read. John and Cathy are then able to choose books they know their customers will enjoy and they are always happy to receive suggestions for specific titles which can be reserved free of charge as part of this service.

'The Library staff choose better books than I do myself.'

The Library also provides a selection-only version of the Home Library and Information Service. This is available for people who are eligible for the service but have a family member or friend who is able to collect the books from the Library on their behalf. The customer completes a reader profile form when they register for this service and Library staff use this information to choose their books.

Do you remember learning mnemonics at school? Can't remember what a mnemonic is? It's something that helps you remember something important.

Learning the musical notes for the recorder, our teacher stressed *Every Good Boy Deserves Favour* to remind us of the order of the musical notes. Or what about *Richard Of York Gave Battle In Vain?* Correct. It is the colours of the rainbow. Do you remember what *Many Volcanoes Erupt Mulberry Jam Sandwiches Under Normal Pressure* referred to? I'll tell you later!

The Greeks had a mnemonic for Jesus that they used in their art and which has been used in many religious buildings since. It is the symbol IHS, which are actually the letters J E S in Greek and the first part of the name Jesus. They can be found on memorials, stained glass windows, and in Christ Church they cover the ceiling of the chancel designed by the renowned Church architect, Temple Moor.

Our reminders of Jesus are looking decidedly grubby, several are water damaged and in a bad state of repair and don't do justice to our Grade 2 Listed Church or the special occasions, like weddings and worship that take place beneath.

As custodians of our heritage, we have the choice to let things deteriorate further or to do something about it now. The estimate for repair is £20,000, due mainly to the height of the panels and the difficulty of access. If we act now, our insurers may make a contribution towards those parts damaged by water ingress – which has now been fixed. If we wait we could lose this.

As the Chancel is the focal point for all services in Church, we have decided to go ahead this autumn, rather than wait for an upturn in the economy, which could be a very long time in coming. It is a lot of money to find, but we hope with the goodwill of the community that this will be possible.

Coaches Matty Hamer and Ian Vallely believe this squad of players will mature into a strong team. Ayton <u>Under-10s</u>, coached by Richard Davey and Chris Hore, are in their second season and have progressed well, lying in mid-table. With a bit more consistency the team could easily be competing with the division's top sides. We hope to build a bigger squad and challenge for honours as we move to 11-a-side next season.

Dulcis was born in the Wirral and grew up there with her older sister, attending the Parish School, then the local High School until she was 16. When World War 2 began, Dulcis was given a job with the Air Raid patrol making sure everyone was safely indoors. Aged 18, she joined the ATS Signals, training as a radio operator. She became proficient in Morse Code and could assemble a radio almost blindfold. She learnt many new skills and travelled all over the country.

Through this work she met her husband to be, John Hinton, then a Major in the Army, just returned from Burma. They married in 1946 and moved over to the North East as John worked for the well known family firm of Amos Hinton, and their first home was on Ormesby Road in Normanby, where Christine and Bill were born. In 1953 they moved to Swan's Corner where Peter and Robert were born, and Dulcis was very much a full time mother. Family times were special, particularly the holidays at Sandsend, staying with a local landlady before getting their own cottage, allowing them to remain throughout summer, with the children able to take a fishing coble out into the bay to spin for mackerel or to check the lobster pots.

Tragically John died at the very early age of 50, actually on Dulcis' birthday. His chest had been badly affected with asthma following his service in Burma, and we must remember today that our soldiers and their families often continue paying the price for conflict long after wars have ceased.

Dulcis was a rock for her children at this time, and as well as being mum, worked out her own grief by helping others through voluntary work in the area. She had already been a member of the Ladies Circle, and following John's death became a Samaritan. Listening to the needs of those on the phone, she realised that many were in that situation because they needed practical help, so she trained as an advisor for the Citizens Advice Bureaux. John had been a Justice of the Peace, and Dulcis followed in his footsteps becoming a JP and continuing to serve until she had to retire at 70.

Dulcis enjoyed singing with a local choral society, and also enjoyed the game of bridge. She was a member of the Leven Arts Society, and when she had left Stokesley to live in Gt Ayton, I remember the lovely pictures of the Lake District that she had painted, which were hanging on the wall of her apartment at Leven Court, when she hosted a small gathering of ladies for Holy Communion in her flat.

She was also a most generous lady, willing to help local charities financially when they were in need, including the CCA at various times over the years, and *The Stream*, sponsoring the production of the A4-size issues for those with limited vision.

Thanks must go especially to the staff of Nunthorpe Hall for their wonderful care over the last four years, for all they did to make Dulcis so comfortable and to preserve her dignity. May she rest in peace.

Youngsters in Ayton have signalled the end to unruly behaviour at their play park. Members of the village Youth Club want vandalism, drinking, graffiti, rubbish and noise to be a thing of the past.



They have produced new rules, for anyone using the Central Way facility, which call for 'Respect' and list behaviour which is not acceptable.

Residents living near the park had been disturbed by young people using it – often late at night – but now, with the help of the new rules - mounted on signs recently - it is hoped everyone will be away by 10 pm and will respect their neighbours.

North Yorkshire County Council's 4 Youth Service established the Youth Club last year, based at Yatton House, which is primarily used as a day care and activity centre by Mencap; up to 20 young people now get together there every week.

"The young people at the Club wanted to see the park used sensibly, so, by working with members of the Community Safety Partnership - including the Police, District Council and Broadacres - they have come up with the new signs," said Lee Godfrey from Broadacres Housing Association. "The signs show how they are determined to make a positive contribution to improving the park for everyone – and to making the area a safer place."

Matty Thomas, who was one of the group putting up the signs, added: "Being involved in this project makes us all feel like the park is ours. We want to make it a place people want to visit – and kick out the unacceptable behaviour. We hope these signs will help do that."

The rules include: no graffiti, no alcohol drinking, no swearing, no fires, keeping the noise down, binning rubbish and leaving by 10 pm.

In addition to the signs, the group are looking at marking out the five-a-side football pitch and also getting some nets for the goals. This was one of the things the young people felt would make the park more attractive to play in.

CAN THERE BE "WACKY" IN WORSHIP?

I always used to suspect that God prefers it when we dress nicely for Church, sit quietly when the preacher is speaking and put our hands together, closing our eyes tightly, for prayer. We do not interact with those around us, except when expressly given permission to do so. We have a long tradition of this!

The people of God are now asking themselves if this is what God truly requires of worshippers! The people at the Methodist Church have been trying more contemporary styles of worship (at the 10.30 service) and each week include an all-age dimension to worship and prayer which welcomes the small child who needs to wander around being a bit noisy, and the teenager who can't keep still, as well as all who enjoy a more interactive opportunity to worship.

Lately, we have been trialling one-off café-style services which see tinies, children, teens, parents and older people gathered round tables together, sharing in learning of the love of God through craft, competition, fun, contemporary music, cake, coffee and a bouncy castle. The central point of Jesus' love for all is clear, as is the message that "all are most welcome".

I suspect that God prefers it when we don't stereotype Christians as sombre – it reflects badly! I also suspect that God prefers us to discover the sweetness of his love that transforms the lives of those who get to know him. I suspect that you will be as surprised as I am each time I pray with my eyes open and watch his blessings unfold around me.

How did it all start?

After the founding of the Camphill schools, near Aberdeen, for children with special needs, many parents worried that their children would move on to state mental institutions, wasting the talents revealed by their inspiring education. In 1955, guided by Dr Karl Konig, the founder, the Botton Hall Estate was purchased. A new kind of village was created – where adults with a mental disability could live a normal life in a caring community, each making a real contribution according to personal potential. There is now a population of about 320 living in 30 houses. Botton is simply a collection of families, each with its own characteristics. Typically, a couple, with or without children of their own, act as house parents, assisted by young, trainee co-workers. They are responsible for up to 8 adults with special needs, all working together to make the house a family home.

Who runs it?

We do! Botton is one of 11 Camphill Village Trust communities, each responsible for its own governance. Overall accountability rests with our Local Management Committee, but deciding the practicalities of everyday life lies firmly with those who live here.

How is it supported?

Through a variety of agencies, primarily North Yorkshire's "Supporting People" scheme and Social Services care budgets. Housing Benefit helps with accommodation costs, while Income Support and Disability Living Allowance cover personal living expenses. We also receive income from the sales of our crafts and produce, but must fund-raise to pay for new buildings or improvements. There are 5 farms, several gardens and a dozen work-shops in Botton producing everything from bio-dynamic dairy foods to fine hand-crafted toys.

Is anyone paid for their work?

No-one receives a wage here. We work to meet the needs of the rest of the community. Every job is important – home-making, gardening, milking the cows or doing the accounts – we do not value one person's work above another's: each task is essential in its own way. Each person's individual needs are met, not from his own work, but from the work of all.

Is there a special philosophy?

Yes, definitely. Camphill communities are based on the work of the Austrian philosopher Dr Rudolf Steiner (1861 – 1925). His ideas are practised throughout the world in education, agriculture, medicine, economics & social life. Work is one of the fundamental tenets of our philosophy; another is learning through creative activities. Both give a huge sense of achievement.

What about social activities?

Although we are each free to observe our own religion, the community practises Christian values and holds Christian services throughout the week. We have a very rich cultural and social life, especially at the main Christian festivals, and a continuing programme of adult education courses. Among other things, there's a bio-dynamic agriculture course (an enhanced form of organic husbandry) and a Waldorf (Steiner) school for children of co-workers and those from local families.

What has Botton achieved?

Our way of life is not the answer to everyone's needs, but for the vulnerable adults living here now, or who could benefit in the future, it offers a rewarding, fulfilling and happy life – for however long or short a time they choose to stay. Botton has been the inspiration for dozens of communities worldwide. There are now over 90 Camphill places in 20 countries, run on similar lines to Botton Village.

Our Open Day (or Summer Fair) is on the first Sunday in July - do come and see us.

Roseberry School, Darjeeling, entered its 4th school year at the beginning of March with 72 pupils. Our Director had the difficult task of turning away pupils. Staff were kept busy during the winter months, clearing out another damp dark store room under a nearby building in order to accommodate the latest admissions, and although they are all making the best of a bad job, we are thankful that plans for our new extension are making good progress.

Building funds have reached £52,000, and we heartily thank our supporters for making 2009 such a good year. We should be able to build 3 floors of our extension, but demand for places is so high that we hope to construct a 4th floor which could cost around £25,000 more than we have at the moment. This large space would provide more classrooms, as well as much needed indoor activity areas, and open up the possibility of adult literacy classes too.

We have a new event on our calendar this year: a <u>Christmas Fair</u> at <u>Stokesley Town Hall</u> on <u>Saturday October 30th from 10 am to 2 pm</u>. HOW MUCH DO YOU KNOW ABOUT GEOBARS??

Last time I wrote that 2009 was the 30th anniversary of Traidcraft, and the Geobar's 10th anniversary. If you have still never tried a Geobar, you have missed out, in my opinion; they are cereal bars which come in 4 different flavours and are widely available in shops and supermarkets. (In Ayton you can buy them in at least 3 different places).

The Geobar is truly historic. When it was launched, nearly 11 years ago now, it was the first ever composite fair trade product. This means it was the first item ever to be made from fairly traded ingredients from more than one supplier. Until then the only Fairtrade items were single ingredients such as cocoa, sugar, coffee, tea and fruit. In fact Geobars contain raisins from South Africa, honey and blueberries from Chile, wild apricots from Pakistan, chocolate from Bolivia, rice from India - to name a few! - and all ingredients which can possibly be Fairtrade are fully Fairtrade certified. More than 26 million Geobars were sold last year.

All very interesting you may be thinking, but why is that important?? The reason is that single ingredient sales can never be very high, because most people buy a lot of their food already made up. Development of ready-made products allows the Fairtrade market to expand into the mainstream and become a bigger part of our normal shopping.

42 THE "BACK STORY" OF ONE HOLLYGARTH RESIDENT

Mr Jack McDonald was born into a farming family in September 1919. For many years his family farmed Baysdale Farm, high up above Kildale on the North York Moors. Jack started his educational life at the Kildale village school, with no public transport or free school dinners. He had to walk some 3 or 4 miles to school, carrying his midday meal and a can of cold tea with a lid on (known as a Billie Can). In the cold weather Jack warmed his tea on the school stove which burned coke and heated the school. Jack soon got settled into school life and was not long before he was playing for the school football and cricket teams. On leaving school, being an enthusiastic sportsman, he was soon playing for his local Kildale cricket and football teams.

Jack found that farming was not for him and decided to leave home and seek pastures new, telling his father of his decision. He did not object, and Jack enlisted for a period of time in the RAF. On September 3rd 1939 hostilities broke out and Jack, like any other serviceman, was on active service.

In the early 1940s, while stationed in the Blackpool area, he met a girl called Phyllis. A courtship developed and they married on December 24th 1942.
