GREAT AYTON, a large and well built village, with several neat mansions, two oil mills, a corn mill, two tanneries, and several linen weavers, is pleasantly seated in a fertile vale, on the banks of a rivulet, about a mile south of the conical mountain of Roseberry Topping, upon the Guisbrough road, 3 miles N. E. by E, of Stokesley. Its township increased its population from 865 souls in 1801, to 1,103 in 1831, and contains 3,059A. 3R. 16p. of land, including many scattered houses and the high moorland hamlet of *Langbaurgh*, which gives name to this extensive liberty, as noticed at page 663, and consists of three farms belonging to John Richardson, Esq., and Mr.Wm. Garbutt; the former of whom has a handsome stone mansion here. Great Ayton comprises half of Roseberry Topping, (see p. 23,) and Mrs Elizabeth Proctor is lady of the manor, but a great part of the soil belongs to other proprietors, several of

Ayton Hall is the seat and property of Thomas Graham, Esq. The parish.comprises also Little Ayton and Nunthorpe. The Church (All Saints) is a plain but neat fabric, and contains an elegant monument in memory of Commodore Wilson, who distinguished himself as commander-in-chief of the marine forces of the East India Company. The perpetual curacy is valued at £82, and was augmented with £800 of Q. A. B. from 1772 to '92, and with £800 in parliamentary grants, in 1813 and 1822. The Rev. Geo.Marwood, is patron, and the Rev. Jph. Ibbetson, B. A., incumbent. The Society of Friends, the Independents, and the Wesleyan and Primitive Methodists have each a chapel in the village. In 1674, John Coulson bequeathed to the poor of Great and Little Ayton, a yearly rent charge of £115s. Those of Great Ayton have a yearly rent charge of £6, left by Wm. Younge, in 1678, out of land now belonging to the Martin family; and £7 IOs. as the rent of 3a. of land, at Falsgrave, near Scarborough, left by Eliz. Bulson.

The School at Great Ayton was rebuilt in 1786, on the site of an ancient building bequeathed by Michael Postgate. The master is appointed by the rate payers, and receives £10 6s, per annum, of which £4 IOs. is paid out of the rent of the poor's land at Falsarave, and £5 16s. out of the poor rates, in consideration of £120 subscribed in 1786, and employed in building the poor house, in which the master has the use of an apartment and a garret over it. He teaches 8 free scholars. In this humble school, *Capt. Cook*, the celebrated circumnavigator, received the rudiments of his education, at the expence of Thomas Scottowe, Esq., under whom his father acted as hind, at the Aireyholme farm.

LITTLE AYTON la a small scattered hamlet, half a mile E of Great Ayton, and has in its township 68 souls, and 1,170 acres of land, including three farms called Tunstall. Mrs. Eliz. Proctor is lady of the manor, but Tunstall belongs to Sir Wm. Pennyman, and several other freeholders have estates here. The farmers are Jas. Clark, Hanb. Ellerhy &. Rd. Nightingale, of Tunstall; and Wm. Boyes, John Fletcher, Dd. Garbutt, Wm. Mallum, Stn. Rowntree, Geo. Smith, Mtw. Thurlow, Jn.o Welford, & Rachel White.
