AYTON is a parish, comprising the townships of GREAT AYTON. LITTLE AYTON and NUNTHORPE, in the Cleveland division of the Riding, west division of Langbaurgh liberty, petty sessional division of Langbaurgh West, Stokesley union and county court district, rural deanery of Stokesley, archdeaconry of Cleveland and diocese of York. Great Ayton is pleasantly situated about a mile south of the conical mountain of Roseberry Topping, and consists principally of one broad street 2 miles long, intersected by a small rivulet crossed by a stone bridge of two arches and two of wood: it is 3 miles north-east from Stokesley and 6 south-west from Guisborough, and has a station threequarters of a mile east from the village on the North Eastern railway. The old' church of All Saints is a low structure, the greater portion of remote origin: it was repaired in 1790, and is now only used for burials. Christ Church, a handsome building of stone in the Early English style, was opened in 1876 at a cost of £5,000, and consists of chancel, nave, aisles, north porch with a narthex at the west end and a spiral tower containing a peal of 6 tubular bells, with chimes: in the chancel is a stained window in memory of the Marwood family: there are 450 sittings. The register dates from the year 1666. The living is a vicarage, with Easby annexed, yearly value £200, including 28 acres of glebe, with residence, in the gift of George Frederic Marwood esq. and the Archbishop of York alternately, and held since 1883 by the Rev. Richard Marsden Withington M.A. Of Corpus Christi college, Cambridge. The tithes of Great Ayton amount to £498, and are impropriated. There are Congregational, Wesleyan and Primitive Methodist chapels, and the Society of Friends have a meeting-house. A cemetery of 3 acres, with superintendent's lodge, was formed in 1882 at a cost of £1,800: it is under the control of a Burial. ~ Board of nine members. At the extremity of the village is a square, called High Green, a great portion of the south side of which is occupied by the Friends' Meeting-house and the North of England Agricultural School, established in 1841: the latter is an extensive substantial plain building, under the care of Friends of Durham Quarterly meeting, for the education and maintenance of 44 boys and 36 girls, under the superintendence of Ralph Dixon: the former are instructed in reading, writing and arithmetic, also all the pursuits of horticulture and agriculture : the girls are trained for domestic purposes. Here is a tannery and a water and steam flour mill. It was in this village the great circumnavigator, Captain Cook, was first taught to read and write, and the churchyard contains a tombstone to the memory of his parents, who were inhabitants of the village. Here are four almshouses, erected in 1859, and supported by Thomas Richardson esq. for the benefit of poor members of the Society of Friends. Ayton Hall, a very ancient edifice, is the residence of John Theobald Butler esq. and is the property of Mr. Monkhouse Graham. Cleveland Lodge, a handsome modern mansion, is the seat of Jonathan Backhouse Hodgkin esq. The lady of the manor is Mrs. Cooper. The principal landowners are Edward Heneage Wynne-Finch esq. J.P. of Stokesley Manor, George F. Marwood esq. J.P. of Busby Hall, H. C. A. Jackson esq. Geo. Jackson esq. and J. B. Hodgkin esq. The soil is loam; subsoil, clay. The area of the township is 3,589 acres; rateable value, £7,293. The population of the township in 1881 was 1,754
