AYTON is a village and parish, comprising the townships of Great Ayton, Little Ayton with Tunstall, Nunthorpe and Easby, in the Cleveland division of the Riding, west division of Langbaurgh liberty, petty sessional division of Langbaurgh West, Stokesley union and county court district, rural deanery of Stokesley, archdeaconry of Cleveland and diocese of York. Great Ayton is pleasantly seated about a mile south of the conical mountain of Roseberry Topping, and consists principally of one broad street about a mile long, lighted with gas by a company, and intersected by a small rivulet crossed by a stone bridge of two arches and two of wood. Great Ayton station is threequarters of a mile east from the village on the Middlesbrough and Battersby branch of the North Eastern railway, and is 3 miles north-east from Stokesley. The old church of All Saints, a low and ancient structure, was repaired in 1790, but is not now in use. Christ Church, erected in 1876 at a cost of £5,000, is of stone in the Early English style, and consists of chancel, nave, aicles, north porch, a narthex porch at the west end and a tower with spire containing a peal of 8 tubular bells, with chimes: there are memorial windows to the Marwood family, to the late Dr. and Mrs. Loy, of Ayton, and to Mrs. Henry Curry, of Stockton: the church affords 450 sittings. The register dates from the year 1666. The living is a vicarage, with Easby annexed, joint net yearly value ,£185, including 28 acres of glebe, with residence, in the gift of William Fras. Marwood esq. and the Archbishop of York alternately, and held since 1883 by the Rev. Richard Marsden Withington M.A. of Corpus Christi College, Cambridge, who is also incumbent of Nunthorpe. The tithes of Great Ayton amount to £685, and are impropriated. There is a Congregational chapel, erected in 1813, with 200 sittings, also Wesleyan and Primitive Methodist chapels, and a Society of Friends have a meeting-house at High Green. A cemetery of 3 acres, with superintendent's lodge, was formed in 1882 at a cost of £1;800. Here are iron ore mines, a water flour mill and three quarries. In this village the great circumnavigator, Captain Cook, born at Marton-in-Cleveland, 27 Oct. 1728, was first taught to read and write, and the churchyard contains a tombstone to his parents, who were inhabitants of the village: at Easby, near Stokesley; on the summit of a hill, is a monument to his memory. High Green is an open space at the extremity of the village of Ayton. Here are four almshouses, erected in 1859, by Thomas Richardson esq. for the benefit of poor members of the Society of Friends. The trustees of the Procter family are lords of the manor. The principal landowners are Arthur John Dorman esq. J.P. of Grey Towers, Nunthorpe; Edward Heneage Wynne-Finch esq. of Stokesley Manor; William Fras. Marwood esq. C.B.

of 13 Bruton Street, London W; H. C. A. Jackson esq. John James Emerson esq. of Easby Hall; J. B. Hodgkin esq. of Darlington; Alfred Edward Kitching esq. of Ayton Firs, Little Ayton, and the trustees of the late Thomas Graham. The soil is loam; subsoil, clay. The area of Great Ayton township is 3,590 acres; rateable value, £10,400; the population of the township in 1901 was 1674 and in 1911 was 2,319.

Friends' School, Great Ayton, established in 1841, for the education of boys & girls; attached to the school are some entrance scholarships & one leaving scholarship of £20; there is a well-fitted gymnasium, a chemical laboratory, a swimming bath & ample play¬grounds, besides two fields which afford excellent facilities for out-door recreations; there are now 70 boys & 40 girls, all boarders; the school is managed by Friends belonging to the Durham Quarterly meeting; H. Kitching esq. J.P, chairman; Frank Rivers Arundel (London University), head master; J. L. Baker B.Sc. assistant master; Miss M. S. Wells, head assistant mistress

Public Elementary (mixed), erected with master's house at the sole expense of the late George Marwood esq. for 170 children; average attendance, 100; Ernest Pargeter, master

Public Elementary (infants), High Green, erected in 1843 & enlarged in 1884, for 170 children; average attendance, 100; Miss Simpson, head mistress

Public Elementary, California, erected on a site given by A. E, Kitching esq. & named the Edward Kitching Council school, opened Oct. 1908, for 148 children; average attendance, 130; John H. Cooper, master

LANGBAURGH is a hamlet, a quarter of a mile north, which gives name to a large liberty or wapentake. **LITTLE AYTON** with TUNSTALL forms a township in this parish. The tithe amounts to £201, and i; impropriated. The trustees

of the late Mrs. Procter, who are lords of the manor, Arthur John Dorman esq. J.P., and Alfred Edward Kitching esq. D.L., J.P. are the chief landowners. The area is 1,378 acres; rateable value, £1,683; the population in 1911 was 141 Letters through Great Ayton

EASBY, near Stokesley, is a township and village, in Ayton parish, pleasantly situated in s well-wooded part of the county, x mile north-east from Ingleby station oa the North Yorkshire and Cleveland branch of the North Eastern railway, and is 4 miles east from Stokesley. Easby Hall, the seat of John James Emerson esq. J.P.. LL.D. lord of the manor and principal landowner, is a handsome mansion of stone, standing at the foot of a lofty hill, the summit of which is crowned by a monument erected to the great circumnavigator, Captain Cook, who was born at Marton in Cleveland, in this neighbourhood, Oct. 27, 1728, educated at Ayton, and massacred at Owhyhu, Sandwich Islands, Feb. 14, 1779: the monu-ment was erected in 1827 by subscriptions raised in Whitby, and in 1895 was restored by the readers of the "North Eastern Daily Gazette," and railings to protect it were erected by J. J. Emerson esq. The private chapel, rebuilt in 1881 by the late James Emerson esq at a cost of £2,500, is a building of stone in the Gothic style, consisting of chancel, nave and a western tower, with spire, containing one bell: the entrance is through the base of the tower: outside the chapel, at the east end, is a mausoleum, erected as a burial place for the Emerson family, and including a canopied recess with a cross in memory of Ann Dorothy, wife of the late James Emerson esq. of Easby, d. May, 1880: the windows of the nave and chancel are filled with stained glass as memorials to Eleazer Biggins esq. d, 1855, and his wife, d. 1865; the late James Emerson esq. and to other members of the Emerson family: the chapel and mausoleum are now the property of John James Emerson esq.: there are sittings for 70 persons. Divine service is conducted here on Sundays by the vicar of Kirkby-in-Cleveland as private chaplain to J. J. Emerson esq. The tithes, commuted at £177 8s. 6d. are paid to the vicar of Great Ayton. The registers since 1880 are kept at Ayton, and the earlier registers at Stokesley, to which parish Easby formerly belonged. There is a Wesleyan chapel here. The soil is loam, and the sub-soil clay. The chief crops are wheat, barley and oats.

The area is 1211 acres; rateable value, £1,284; the population in 1911 was 113.
