### Low Green Shops in 1939

Dixon Brothers, grocers – No. 31 Bridge Street  
Anderson's Fish & Chips – No. 16, Bridge Street  
Elizabeth Monkman greengrocers – No. 5-9 Bridge Street  
John Bradby, blacksmith – No 1 Race Terrace

1950's - Buck Hotel



1960's – Elsie Brunskill's shop  
at No 31 Bridge Street. This shop became  
a bike shop for a few years around 1990.  
It was converted to a private house  
after the bike shop shut – as below



1960's – 20-22 Bridge Street, Langton Garage owned by John Mayfield for many years – car repairs, MOT's etc. It closed about 2000.

The garage was originally Carlin's Brewery, which closed by 1880. There was a pub close to the brewery, "The Red Lion", which closed by 1857 and which is now No. 2 Race Terrace



 Teesside's famous parmo is made using chicken or  
 pork fillet in breadcrumbs topped with bechamel  
 sauce and cheddar cheese. They were originally  
 topped with Parmesan which led to the name.
