Reg Williamson's Glass Plate Photographs

Reg Williamson took photographs in Great Ayton over many years, doing most of his own developing and printing. These 118 digital images were taken from a collection of glass plate photographs discovered and rescued from the attic of Laurence Dilcock's Pharmacy in Park Square by his son, John Dilcock, 23 Station Road, Great Ayton.

Reg's Williamson's daughter (Mrs Marjorie Rees of Pendine, Camarthenshire) and grandson (Des Rees) identified the people in the Williamson family photographs. The remaining identifications are by residents of Great Ayton, although many of the images have not yet been identified. Any additional identifications, or corrections to those existing, will be gratefully received.

Who was Reg Williamson?

Reg was born in 1893 at Yarm, one of nine children. He was an apprentice chemist from 1910 to 1914, then served in First World War, reaching the rank of Second Lieutenant. In 1919, he married Malvinia Venie and came to live in Great Ayton, on Romany Road, in the early 1920s. Reg rented a small pharmacy in Park Square, but it flooded several times and he bought a larger premises, also in Park Square "R.S. WILLIAMSON, PHARMACY"




About 1927 Reg and Malvinia moved to "South View" on High Green, close to the pharmacy. They had three children: Marjorie, Howard and Colin. In addition to running the pharmacy, Reg became the established village photographer, much in demand for weddings and christenings.

Always an active person, the Second World War opened up new opportunities. In addition to the normal business of the pharmacy, Reg took up the to manufacture of preparations no longer available commercially. He developed Williamson's Egg Emulsion, Williamson's Cologne Skin Cream, also face cream and various pills. But his most important role, and one that was a secret even from his own family, was as a member of Great Ayton's Auxiliary Unit. This was part of a secret army who would carry out acts of sabotage in the event of a German invasion. His daughter Marjorie remembers "We thought he was in the Home Guard, as everyone did, and I didn't know about the secret army until about forty years after the war, when the information was released. The group used to go up to the moors where they had ammunition hidden under Roseberry Topping in the old mines, preparing for a possible invasion."

After working in Great Ayton for thirty years or so, he retired and moved to Wales, leaving the box of glass plate photographs in the attic above the pharmacy. Reg died in 1980. The pharmacy had been taken over by Laurence Dilcock, whose son John discovered the box and digitised the photographs you see on the following pages.



Judging by the dress, this seems to be the oldest photograph in the collection. In fact the older photographs, some of which carry dates, are a mystery since they pre-date the time Reg came to Great Ayton in the early 1920s. The occasion and location of the above picture are unknown, but the seated figure fourth from the left could be Waynman Dixon of Ayton House. If so, this might be the opening of the Conservative Club in 1910.










